and decision making are driven by the vision that education is for life. Providing high quality collective worship each day enriches the lives of pupils and adults. Partnership with the Diocese of Lichfield ensure these moments are spiritual and promote key Christian values. Through the nurture and compassion shown by staff, pupils are enabled to thrive.

A commitment to provide inspiring teaching and learning is upheld by leaders. The school curriculum has been crafted around its vision and values. Extensive use of technology provides a platform for growth. It supports pupils in expressing their learning in a variety of ways. Pupils benefit from the strong communication technology provides to parents. It also enables the most able to be challenged in their learning. Barriers to learning are also removed, allowing pupils to record and express their knowledge. Leaders use funding to support those who are vulnerable or with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND). A cherished space called the 'Learning Lab' provides a nurturing atmosphere in which to work. Reading programmes are used to boost learning. This ensures that the curriculum is fully accessible and inclusive. This enables pupils to flourish across the curriculum, using effective reading strategies. Love is demonstrated in the school's approach to extra-curricular activities. A breakfast club provides care and additional learning support. There are also a wide range of opportunities for sport and music. Teachers are empowered by professional development provided by the trust. A well-planned programme of monitoring by governors ensures that knowledge is embedded, and the curriculum meets the needs of pupils. Teachers plan moments for reflection and spiritual growth in lessons. However, a shared understanding of spiritual development is not firmly embedded. This means that there are insufficient opportunities for pupils to reflect on their learning.

Collective worship is at the heart of the school vision. Care is taken to welcome all to whole school gatherings. Leaders work closely with the diocese to provide stimulating spiritual experiences. Responsibility is given to pupils as chaplains. They are involved in the planning of worship and promote it with their peers. This strengthens the value of worship for pupils and increases confidence. Close links with the local church community enriches worship. Visits to church provide opportunities for rich spiritual growth, through reflection and stillness. Prayer is encouraged and valued during the day. Each class regularly writes a book of prayers that are shared together. 'Talk with God' areas also encourage calmness to support mindfulness. Adults benefit from worship and share how they grow spiritually during these times. There are frequent moments after worship that spark discussion. This allows pupils to deepen their understanding of the impact of faith on their thinking. Worship motivates them into acts of compassion. It encourages an awareness of global issues that they respond to.

Leaders foster a culture where everyone is treated well. They strive to meet the needs of the wider community. The school hosts a foodbank and links with supermarkets to meet basic needs locally. This means pupils are cared for and ready to learn at the start of the day. Promoting good mental health is a priority. Teachers make strong links with families so that they clearly understand needs. Adults also feel valued by leaders and appreciate care given by governors and trust leaders. Every pupil is important, regardless of the challenges they face. Mutually respectful relationships are a clear expression of the Christian vision. Behaviour policies are based on values of love and forgiveness. This encourages them to live well together, and parents confirm how effective this is. Pupils are presented with value cards to reward their attitude and actions. These are celebrated during times of worship to which families are invited. Pupils also present them to adults. This demonstrates the vision of love and respect where flourishing is strong.

To promote an understanding of justice and diversity, the school uses famous role models as inspiration. Examples include Emmeline Pankhurst and Helen Keller. They inspire pupils by promoting perseverance during challenges. Pupils learn about the importance of bravery and perseverance. This encourages them to become agents of change in their own society. Action



includes fund raising for a charity supporting cancer research. Through the curriculum, they learn about the impact of war and the lives of refugees. This enables them to understand those who have settled in their community. The school council raises awareness of issues such as pollution and ways to reduce this. Projects looking at animals are enriched with visitors from a zoo. This widens awareness of the dangers of extinction. Prompted by the school vision, pupils articulate views about the difference love can make to the global community.

The importance of RE is clearly demonstrated. The syllabus is frequently updated to provide contemporary topics and skills. This ensures that learning deepens pupils' understanding of faith and belief in the community around them. Leaders work with the diocese to effectively train staff. A planned period of monitoring by governors ensures that the curriculum provides challenge. However, the impact and effectiveness of the RE curriculum is not wholly clear to staff. As a result, the depth of pupils understanding is limited. Pupils show enthusiasm in lessons and thrive on exploring different faiths and worldviews. This means that they appreciate a diverse understanding of religion. Well sequenced planning secures knowledge of Christian festivals and Bible teaching builds year on year. A strong network in the trust enables leaders and staff to share good practice. This supports exciting lessons that are relevant to the school community. Challenging philosophical questions are used in each unit to encourage deep thinking. For example, learning about life after death helps them to understand more about their own experiences. Practical lessons motivate discussions and self-expression. Pupils learn how to debate well in a culture of respect. By exploring RE in this way, they grow in their own spiritual journey.
